Renovations to DeSales Educational Building now complete:

After almost 13 long years of planning, demolition and construction, renovations to the entire DeSales Educational Building are now complete. Beginning in 2010 with the construction of the Mitsubishi Library and recently ending with the demolition and construction of 9 new classrooms, a science room, and art room on the second floor, over 70,000 sq ft of state-of-the-art living and learning space has been created. All Higashi students from elementary to high school have the opportunity to attend classes in beautiful, spacious, bright, colorful classrooms equipped with all the technology enhancements in place to maximize their educational experience. Planning and execution of this major undertaking could not have taken place without the extraordinary patience and cooperation of all our staff.

New Storage and Retail Shed at the Higashi Farm:

This past fall construction of a 240sq ft shed at the Daily Life Farm was completed. The shed will have multiple functions – equipment storage, classroom and meeting space, a refrigeration area for harvested crops and the primary point of sale to members of the public. The shed in of itself will provide numerous vocational training opportunities for our students and members of the Continuing Adult Education Program (CAEP). We are extremely excited about all the vocational, social and recreational opportunities that continue to evolve with the Daily Life Farm.

New Climbing Wall for our Younger Students:

Thanks to the generosity of the Boston Bruins Foundation a 20' x 8' traverse climbing wall is currently being constructed off-site by Rockwerx Climbing Walls in Barre, MA. This exciting development was the brainstorm of the Higashi PE Department and will become a reality in the upcoming months. The wall will be branded in the Bruins black and gold, highlighted with their well-recognized bear logo. The wall will serve as a training site for younger students who can eventually transfer their climbing skills to the larger and far more challenging Central Rock Gym, here in Randolph. Many thanks to the Boston Bruins for their continued support, who despite a disappointing ending to their season, will always be champions in our eyes.
